Thank you for your heroic efforts, and may 2024-25 be just a little bit easier. It was this kind of commitment and effort that resulted in our hospital being awarded Exemplary Standing by Accreditation Canada. To achieve such standing under normal circumstances, is remarkable; to do so in the face of staffing, financial and infrastructure challenges, is near-miraculous! It is an accomplishment to be very proud of.

The past year saw Ray Racette, our President and CEO of six years, give notice of his retirement, as of June 21, 2024. Ray guided the hospital with a judicious and steady hand during a period of remarkable challenge and uncertainty. Ray consistently showed grace-underpressure, as he led a dedicated team through uncharted territory. Handling the pandemic, the ensuing staffing crisis, the challenges of hospital financing and operating in an antiquated facility, while still driving the All Nations Hospital project forward, Ray showed remarkable patience, good judgment and wisdom. On behalf of the board, Ray, thank you for your hard work, commitment and dedication to excellence.

Ray's notice of retirement triggered a search for a new President/CEO, which the Board undertook with rigor

and care. After deciding to look first to home-grown talent, we were delighted to name current VP of Operations and CFO, Cheryl O'Flaherty, to replace Ray. Cheryl has had a 20-year career at LWDH and is intimately familiar with its operation, the new hospital project, and has built strong relationships with our partners in that journey. We are proud to see Cheryl become the first woman President and CEO in LWDH history. Congratulations Cheryl! The Board of Directors has every confidence in you, and we look forward to supporting you in your new role.

Aside from regular duties, the Board was involved in refreshing the hospital's bylaws and played an active role in the development and approval of a new strategic plan that will guide us over the next four years. We were delighted this fiscal year to see the important upgrades made in Diagnostic Imaging and how the establishment of the Indigenous Advisory Council has provided several opportunities to enhance programs and services through a wholistic and culturally safe lens. The Board also continued to support the good work of the All Nations Health Partners Ontario Health Team. And finally, the Board continued to work in collaboration with Ogimaawabiitong Kenora Chiefs Advisory Board of Directors to support and monitor the work toward building a new hospital in Kenora. Although the road has been long and winding, we are confident we are moving toward our shared goal of a state-of-the-art facility that will serve the needs of all people in the region.

Thank you to our fund raisers, from the LWDH Auxiliary to the LWDH Foundation, and to our donors, large and small, who do so much to support the hospital's mission. Thank you to all who who volunteer, whether it be through these organizations, by quietly contributing in their own way, or by serving on a hospital committee or working group. All of these efforts make us better.

Thank you to the dedicated team of volunteer board members who worked hard over the past year to fulfill their governance duties. ANNUAL REPORT 2023/2024 - 3



With my retirement from LWDH on June 21, 2024, this will be my last President & CEO Report to the community. Having joined Lake of the Woods District Hospital in September, 2018, it is surprising how fast this moment has come. I am so pleased that I had the privilege of ending my leadership career here, in this region, at this hospital, and during a period of unprecedented opportunity and challenge.

I am very grateful to have served in a region which is highly partnered through a coalition of the willing, the 15 partners making up the All Nations Health Partners (ANHP). It was a tremendous achievement when the ANHP were selected in 2019 to become one of the first 24 Ontario Health Teams approved, and the only one at that time with Indigenous Partners at the table. We have learned so much by collaborating and creating innovative solutions and models to keep our region safe and supported.

#### This past year we advanced key priorities that are critically important for the future:

- 1. Following four years of planning and extensive discussions with provincial decision makers, we were excited when Premier Ford announced the All Nations Hospital Project has been approved by the Province. We thank Minister Rickford for his ongoing support, and are awaiting approval to proceed into the design stage of the project. Planning the All Nations Hospital in a true partnership between LWDH and KCA, our Indigenous partner, has demonstrated the power of collaboration, inclusion and knowledge sharing, so essential for ensuring the new hospital is planned to meet the needs of all people.
  - 2. The LWDH Board of Directors approved a new Strategic Plan for the period 2024 2028 to guide the hospital through an exciting time of change. During this period, the design of the new hospital will be completed, and construction will begin In addition, future service delivery will be considered by the ANHP OHT, which has been selected by the Province as one of twelve OHTs in Ontario to proceed to maturity. The ANHP OHT will become a legal entity and will be considering system design improvements in key areas, including Primary Care, Homecare, and Mental Health and Addictions in our region.
    - 3. We have worked hard to improve access to services. Rehabilitation Services is now providing more services to patients in their home. Dialysis has been expanded significantly to serve more patients from our area. Emergency has added a fast track service led by Nurse Practitioners to see less acute patients sooner. We continue to advance efforts to bring enhanced Diagnostic Imaging services like MRI and state-of-the-art Mammography to LWDH. New services like MRI are only made possible with the support of the LWDH Foundation, their innovative engagement strategies and a loyal donor community that so generously supports enhanced patient care at LWDH.
      - 4. The ANHP OHT is playing a large role in system improvement by proposing a new model for service delivery. This new approach is a generalist physician service model that has been designed by our physicians in collaboration with partners, and negotiated with the Ontario Medical Association and the Ministry of Health. The new model, once approved, will support primary care delivery to all communities as well as physician support to the emergency department and inpatient coverage at LWDH. It includes a progressive physician compensation model that resolves compensation equity issues that have seriously hampered physician recruitment and retention, and significantly contributed to our physician vacancy issues.

In October 2023 Accreditation Canada surveyed LWDH and assessed our services against national standards for hospitals. A team of external surveyors from Accreditation Canada was on-site in the hospital, talking with staff, physicians, board directors, community partners, volunteers, patients and families about our hospital and how we work together to offer safe, quality healthcare services. Following the survey results and assessments. Accreditation Canada awarded LWDH "Accreditation with Exemplary Standing", the highest rating a hospital can be given. Achieving Exemplary Standing is a true achievement to be celebrated, particularly in this challenging post-pandemic period. It recognizes our shared commitment to providing safe, high-quality health services to the region we serve.

I am honoured to have served with a truly outstanding and inspiring team of leaders, hospital staff and professional staff who have demonstrated, on a daily basis, their talent, perseverance, and courage to tackle and endure all of the relentless challenges we have faced. It has not been easy to maintain services for our region in a time of uncertainty triggered by a global pandemic, then followed by a health human resources crisis, but we have. That is the character that makes this hospital special.

To the Board of Directors, thank you for this opportunity, and for your guidance and stewardship during my tenure here. Governing through unprecedented times was also unique for you, and you have done so with the best interests of those we serve in mind.

# Message from the Chief of Staff

Over the past year, we have achieved significant stabilization following the chaos of human resources and financial challenges brought on by COVID and lack of primary care in our region. I want to share my appreciation and gratitude for the nurses, physicians, nurse practitioners, pharmacists, physician assistants, physiotherapists, lab and DI techs, educators, administrative staff, housekeepers, maintenance and the long list of support staff at Lake of the Woods District Hospital who all play essential roles in keeping the hospital moving forward.

We have successfully recruited two new general surgeons, Dr. Jossie Swett-Cosentino and Dr. Julie Kickbush, which means LWDH now has a full complement of General Surgeons. They have already brought significant experience and ideas to our program and are making progress toward tackling the surgical waitlists and helping standardize and optimize our pathways and practices. Kenora is extremely proud to have such a strong surgery program supported by our very dedicated and talented nursing staff.

The Emergency Department (ED) continues to face severe nursing and physician staffing challenges and we anticipate ongoing critical shortages in the year ahead. We have had success negotiating with the province to retain a portion of funding to help support our staffing efforts but are relying on significant support from the Ministry in finding stabilization solutions for the future. Our hospital building is well past the tipping point toward obsolescence, but we have worked tirelessly to mitigate the shortcomings and the space restrictions through multiple phases of ED renovations and the implementation of a tracker board in our ED.

Our Visiting Specialist programs have seen the addition of Dr. Lorne Bellan (Ophthalmology) and Dr. Jeffery Barnes (Neurology) which will aid in moving patient consults and surgeries forwarded. We anticipate new specialist additions to the Gynecology and Orthopedic programs to be in place before the end of this year.

Our Mental Health and Addictions team has experienced a lot of changes this year, including Changes Recovery Homes integration with Lake of the Woods District Hospital. Psychiatry welcomed Dr. Michelle Marlborough in the last year and she has helped the pyschiatric team in finding solutions to catch up on the outpatient waitlists. We currently have a full compliment of three psychiatrists providing much more comprehensive care for inpatients and outpatients for the first time. They have implemented a journal club and are providing scholarly events locally and at a national level.

Our Internal Medicine, Intensive Care, and Hospitalist programs are running smoothly with the leadership of Dr. Lorraine Dooley, Dr. Jean-Marc Rizk and Dr. Brad Kyle and all services engage in our grand rounds, morbidity and mortality rounds



The Diagnostic Imaging department continues to be a leader in providing superb services to our patients and is now focused on bringing to LWDH essential technology such as MRI and enhanced mammography. These health equity issues are critical for our communities and we will need to dig deep to support the purchase of the equipment, and we are counting on our government to see the dire need and recognize our business case as essential steps in the cost-effective care of our patients. We have welcomed a new Laboratory Director, Dr. Tony Mazzulli who will be supporting LWDH as well as other sites in the region. He is the Microbiologist-in-Chief and Infectious Diseases Specialist at Sinai Health and University Health Network, Toronto and a consulting Medical Microbiologist for the Public Health Ontario Laboratories, in addition to many other roles. We are still working through processes of reducing time in pathology reporting through innovations such as digital pathology and AI applications in pathology.

We continue to struggle to gain access to our normal referral centers across provincial boundaries in Manitoba. We have an agreement in place which has been extended to April 1, 2025, and there are changes in the provincial leadership that give us reason to be very optimistic for the years ahead.

The community will forever be thankful for the late Dr. Bill Kyle, who passed last year. Dr. Kyle worked as a physician in Kenora for 30 years as our Radiologist and the head of Diagnostic Imaging. During his tenure, he was instrumental in bringing Ultrasound, Bone Density Scanning and CT Scanning to our community and greatly expanded access to cutting edge care. On a personal note, Dr. Kyle was kind and generous with his time in mentoring me when I first started out as Chief of Staff here – a role that he had served in and excelled at during the 90s. His leadership and legacy have had substantial impacts on the medical care in our region.

There continue to be significant challenges at LWDH, but there is some light at the end of the tunnel as we move out of the post-pandemic years. I would like to thank the Hospital Board, my colleagues in the hospital, and our administration executive assistants for all their continued dedication to helping LWDH provide the best care for our patients during this past year.

The Committee strives to find volunteers that reflect the diversity of cultures in the population that we serve.

We thank all our members, our staff, Leadership Team and partners for their support and dedication to this important work and look forward to continuing this work in the coming years.

#### Accredited with Exemplary Standing

Every four years, our hospital participates in an Accreditation Survey, which provides an opportunity to measure services against national hospital standards. Accreditation identifies what is being done well and what needs improvement and is important because it helps create better health care and social services for you, your family, and your community. It allows organizations to understand how to make better use of their resources, increase efficiency, enhance quality and safety, and reduce risk. Accreditation Canada surveyors visited LWDH in October 2023, talking to staff, physicians, patients and families about our hospital and how we work together to offer safe, quality healthcare services. We were thrilled to receive results from this process and share with our communities that LWDH was awarded "Accredited with Exemplary Standing". This is the highest possible ranking that can be achieved by a hospital. The strength of LWDH is our people and this award is a testament to their collective effort and talent.

#### **Nurse Practitioner Service**

To address seasonal surges in patient volumes, decrease Emergency Department (ED) wait times and to mitigate the risk of closing the ED due to staffing shortages, LWDH opened the Nurse Practitioner (NP) Service in May 2023. This extension of the ED offers an efficient and effective pathway for patients seeking non- emergency care and quickly had an impact on left without being seen rates and average wait times. Patients attending the ED who are triaged as less acute, with a Canadian Triage and Acuity Scale (CTAS) score of 4 or 5, are redirected to the ER South, where the NP Service is located. Since inception, an additional NP has been added to the LWDH team in an effort to see the NP Service operate 7-days a week.

#### LWDH becomes "Mask Friendly"

In May of 2023, after nearly three years of masking brought on by the global COVID-19 pandemic, LWDH began the gradual and careful shift away from mandatory masking. By June LWDH had adopted a "mask friendly" environment and revised visitor policies. This was informed by our excellent Infection Control and Occupational Health and Safety practitioners and will allow the hospital to pivot in the event there is an outbreak and more precautions are required.

Pediatric Feeding and Swallowing Assessments

In August 2023, FIREFLY and LWDH announced that pediatric feeding and swallowing assessments could now take place in Northwestern Ontario due to the recent creation of the Pediatric Complex Feeding and Swallowing Clinic at FIREFLY and the purchase of a new Digital Low Dose Fluoroscopy unit at LWDH. The FIREFLY Clinic provides non-emergency assessment and recommendations for complex feeding and swallowing concerns, while the new Fluoroscopy machine at LWDH has pediatric settings which allows for a much lower dose of radiation to be administered during Video Fluoroscopic Swallow Studies. LWDH is the ONLY facility in Northern Ontario providing this type of pediatric assessment. Prior to August, pediatric clients would be referred to Winnipeg, Thunder Bay, or Southern Ontario which often meant lengthy wait times. The new Fluoroscopy unit was officially opened in February 2023 and was made possible with support from the community through the Lake of the Woods District Hospital Foundation.

#### **CT Enterography**

September 2023 saw LWDH begin to offer this new non-invasive examination, known as one of the best imaging modalities to assess for small bowel abnormalities (such as Crohn's disease, Celiac disease, gastrointestinal bleeds, small bowel tumors and some vascular lesions in the gastrointestinal tract) which are often difficult to visualize on conventional CT scanning. Prior to September, patients requiring CT Enterography needed to travel to Thunder Bay or out of province.

#### **Two-Eyed Seeing Conference**

Through LWDH's participation on the Kenora Rainy River District Mental Health and Addictions Network, our hospital co-hosted this conference in Kenora, in September 2023. The event brought together 155 students, mental health care practitioners, those with lived experience, elders and caregivers for three days of collaboration, education and discussion centered around blending Western Medicine and Traditional Healing. The event spurred the creation of a regional education series.

**Lab Technology** 

In collaboration with Lake of the Woods District Hospital Foundation, the LWDH Laboratory put into place several equipment enhancements in 2023/2024. A significantly impactful advance in technology was the purchase and implementation of TeleVu Smart Glasses which provide real-time support for the grossing Medical Laboratory Technologists (MLT). The smart glasses connect virtually with the Pathology Assistant (PA) at the Toronto General Hospital (TGH) who can then provide immediate assistance to the MLT for difficult or unusual cases. The PA at TGH can see exactly what the LWDH MLT is seeing on the bench as everything is displayed on a monitor in Toronto. The TeleVu Glasses have been used in Ontario hospitals in wound care programs and in Surgical Services, but LWDH was the first to venture into using the technology in a lab setting.

#### **Medical Priority Dispatch System**

November 8th, 2023 marked a major milestone for Kenora's Central Ambulance Communication Centre (CACC) with the successful implementation of the Medical Priority Dispatch System (MPDS). The first call was received at 02:23 hours CST that day. MPDS is a renowned and globally recognized system for processing emergency medical calls efficiently and effectively. It aims to improve prioritization of calls, improve ambulance availability, reduce ambulance offload delays and see paramedic resources better matched to respond to the right patient at the right time. This significant undertaking took nearly a year to come to fruition and was due to the drive, commitment, and flexibility of the entire CACC team. CACC is funded by the Ontario Ministry of Health and Long Term Care and staff are employed by Lake of the Woods District Hospital.

#### Indigenous Self-Identification

The 2023/2024 fiscal year saw the Indigenous Patient Relations Department and Medical Records Department implement Indigenous Self-Identification in our hospital. All hospital patients are now asked if they would like to self-identify as Anishinaabe or Indigenous. Self-Identification is 100% voluntary and the question is asked so that a direct path to resources such as patient navigators and other healing tools can be coordinated to better support patient care for Indigenous patients.

#### LWDH Wellness

Working in healthcare can be extremely challenging. Recognizing that supporting staff in turn supports exceptional patient care, a Staff Social Worker position was put into place this year to provide LWDH employees with immediate support, short term counselling, referrals, and group and individual debriefing after a serious incident.

Our hospital Wellness Committee promotes a culture of Mental, Physical, Emotional and Spiritual well-being by coordinating activities and providing support that will result in a healthier workplace and in healthier lifestyles. Over the 2023/24 year, the Wellness Committee coordinated 10 events, one program, one membership initiative and four engagement activities focused on one or more elements of personal wellness. In total, 658 staff and family members took part in Wellness initiatives over the course of the year!

LWDH also has a Staff Health Physiotherapist dedicated to providing physio assessment, treatment and education for any staff member with a need.

LWDH's Occupational Health and Safety team works to create a safer work environment that reduces the risk of injury and promotes overall well-being. In 2023/2024 various programs and activities were coordianted by this team including new hire orientation, modified and return to work programs, and immunizations.

**Changes Recovery Homes** 

After much work and collaboration in 2023/2024, Changes Recovery Homes (Changes), a recovery home for adults waiting for addictions treatment or requiring continued support post treatment, officially integrated with Lake of the Woods District Hospital on April 1, 2024. More than a residence, Changes has aided in transforming lives in our district for several decades by offering programming, continuous guidance and assistance available at the home. Changes aligns well with the continuum of addiction and mental health care currently provided through LWDH's Mental Health & Addiction Services portfolio. LWDH has had a longstanding partnership with Changes and this integration is an opportunity to deliver a more seamless, coordinated experience for clients and their families in accessing addictions and mental health services. Linkages to traditional healing and cultural supports will also be available for Changes clients through the Indigenous Patient Relations Department.

#### **Indigenous Advisory Council**

This important Council which includes community members, LWDH, Ogimaawabiitong Kenora Chiefs Advisory, and Waasegiizhig Nanaandawe'iyewigamig, made significant progress in 2023/2024, strategizing service enhancements in Diagnostic Imaging and in the Emergency Department considering a wholistic and culturally safe lens. The Council also reviewed the way patient experience feedback is collected in our hospital and provided guidance ahead of Self-Identification implementation.



LWDH has a Staff Recognition Sub-Committee which receives nominations from hospital staff, about their colleagues, who are known to go above and beyond their day-to-day work. The award, titled Beyond Expectations, was presented to staff from Surgical Servcies, Administration, Environmental Services, Emergency, Respiratory, Morningstar Centre, and BioMed as well as Professional Staff. This goes to show just how important and impactful every department of the hospital is.







# **Kenora's New Hospital Campus** (CONCEPT ONLY)



**Together in partnership,** Lake of the Woods District Hospital (LWDH) and Ogimaawabiitong Kenora Chiefs Advisory (KCA) have completed planning to replace the current hospital with a new hospital that will serve all patients, with a blend of Western Medicine and Traditional Healing on a modern, new campus. This will ensure that everyone has the services they require for their care needs. Extensive consultation with staff, partners, the public and other health care facilities has taken place over the last four years to inform an in-depth proposal for government consideration (as a public hospital, the project would be primarily funded by the provincial government). The proposal includes the above recommended concept campus and the following proposed physical and service enhancements:

- A larger physical building and campus
- 100% single patient rooms
- MR
- An ER that is right-sized for major treatment and rapid assessment (lighter care, non acute zone - 6 seats), minor treatment rooms (2 patients), treatment rooms (12), and mental health treatment rooms (3)
- Surgical Services: 3 ORs, procedure room, post-anesthesia recovery room, pre-admission clinic, day surgery unit
- Ceremonial room, Indigenous Resource Centre, traditional kitchen, traditional healing rooms, quiet rooms, multi-faith room, Sweat Lodge and landscaped spaces
- Bariatric rooms
- 4 ICU beds with negative pressure and virtual bedside consult capacity

- Large Palliative Care rooms, lounge and quiet room
- Increased capacity for student and resident placements
- Transitional Care Unit
- 24-bed Mental Health Unit (child, adult, geriatric zones)
- Outpatient Mental Health services managed in separate building on the hospital campus with mental health counselors available in the ER 7-days per week
- Significant staffing expansion
- 2 withdrawal management beds

At a press conference in April of this year Ontario Premier Doug Ford has confirmed that the province intends to build a new hospital in Kenora. LWDH and KCA anxiously await formal government approval and look forward to sharing more details. **Stay tuned!**

Every hospital committee meeting and event is started with this acknowledgment which has been feasted, adopted in ceremony and is supported by the Lake of the Woods District Hospital Board of Directors:

"I wish to acknowledge that we are meeting on the traditional lands of the Anishinaabe people of Treaty Three and the Métis. Mother earth has allowed us to occupy the land that this building sits on, we will keep this in mind as we move forward working together with one another respectfully, embracing our differences."

The purpose of a land acknowledgment is to demonstrate recognition and respect for Indigenous peoples, both in the past and the present, and the contributions they have made to our communities and the nation. Acknowledging Traditional Territory recognizes and respects Indigenous peoples and the relationship they have with the land on which we gather. Acknowledgment is an essential component of reconciliation. Recognition and respect are essential elements of establishing healthy, reciprocal relationships.



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
